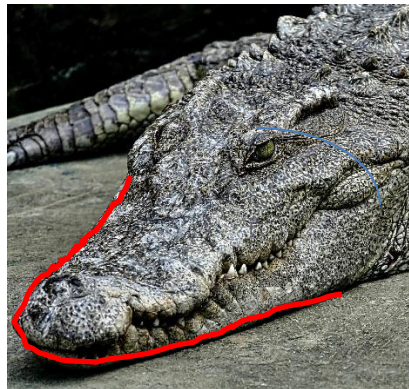


Alligators and crocodiles are reptiles that have lived on earth since the days of dinosaurs.



Although there are crocodiles that live in salt water, alligators and crocodiles that live in the United States live in freshwater habitats like wetlands and swamps. However, there have been many sightings of alligators on golf courses near the ponds. Sometimes alligators are even found in backyard swimming pools but that only happens if the swimming pool is near their normal nesting area.

How can you tell an alligator from a crocodile? You look at their snout, the shape of their head. An alligator has a wider, round snout sort of U-shaped. A crocodile has a narrower, pointed snout sort of V-shaped.



Although most are smaller, alligators can grow to be over 15 feet long and weigh over 1,000 pounds. Crocodiles have grown even bigger. Some of the largest crocodiles have grown longer than 20 feet and over 2,000 pounds, but most are smaller. Both have recorded lifespans of over 70 years with crocodiles living the longest.

Both reptiles have webbed feet and a long tail. In shallow water, their feet are used to walk. However, in deeper water, they tuck their legs to the sides of their body and use their tail to propel them through the water. They can be much faster than a person swimming. They also have flaps that close off their nose and ears when swimming in water and can stay in deeper water for long periods of time.

Alligators and crocodiles are ambush hunters. Their eyes and nose are at the top of their head so the rest of their body can be covered by water which makes them hard to see.



They will wait, quiet and still, for a fish to swim by or an animal to come to the water's edge for a drink. Then they will quickly bite the animal and hold onto it with their sharp teeth.

Unlike humans who only have two sets of teeth, their teeth are constantly worn down and replaced. Alligator and crocodile teeth can be replaced with new teeth over 50 times during their lifetime.

The jaws of these animals are very strong and can bite down with over 1,000 pounds of pressure. However, even though their jaws are strong at biting down, they are very weak in the other direction. An animal trainer can keep the animal's mouth closed simply with his bare hands but we don't recommend you try this.

Speaking of their mouth, did you ever see an alligator or crocodile just lying on land with its mouth wide open? These animals do not sweat. They do this often because, like dogs that pant with their mouth open,



this is how these reptiles cool their body. Because they are cold-blooded, they must find ways to regulate their body temperature. They bask in the sun when they are too cold and go in cool water or open their mouth when too hot.

Alligators and crocodiles hatch from eggs. Whether the animal is born a boy or a girl depends on the temperature of the eggs. If the eggs are warmer than about 92 degrees, a boy is hatched. If the eggs are cooler than about 88 degrees, a girl is hatched.

Temperatures in between can hatch boys or girls. The babies are less than 12 inches long and the mother will carry them to the water in her mouth and then let

them hunt. The babies need no training and are natural hunters.



Outside of zoos, there are very few crocodiles in the United States except in south Florida. Alligators are much more common throughout some of the southern states.

Alligators were placed on the endangered list for fear of extinction due to so many hunters wanting their hides. However, they are now protected by law and are no longer on the endangered list.

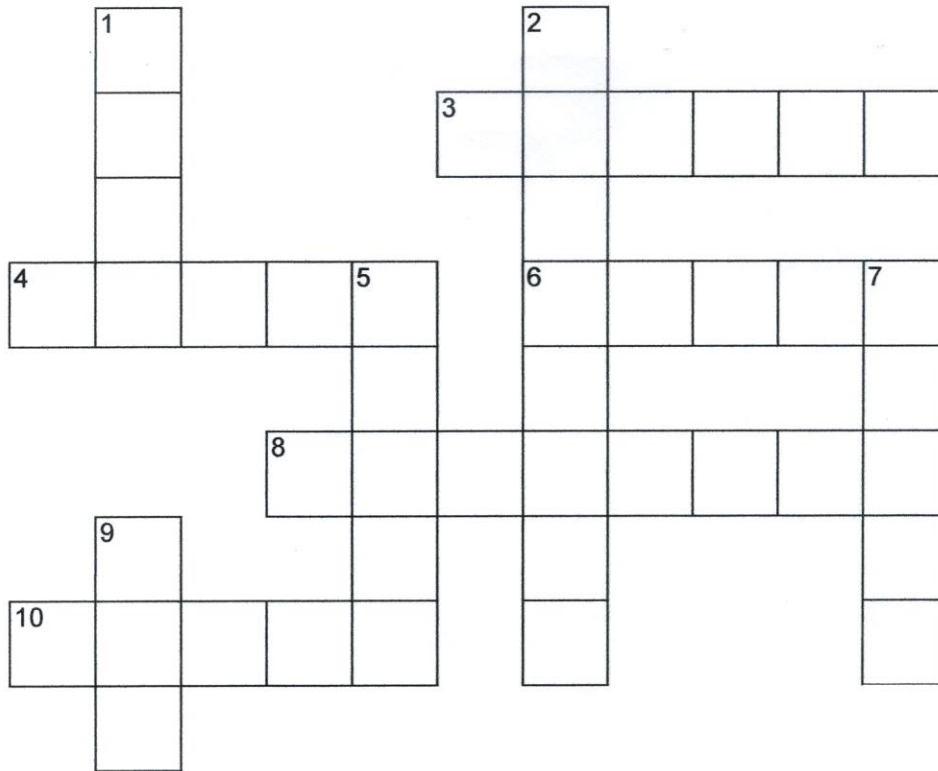
